#### Deed of Gift:

Inspired by the article "The Weather Rail" (published in the "Skulldugger" July, 2022). It is to be given annually to the current or former member, who through their association with JRSC for 20+ years, has greatly enriched the club and its members. This award is presented at the annual Change of Watch, and may at times be given posthumously to the surviving family of the honoree. The names on this plaque represent the best of us. Those who have rightfully earned recognition for a lifetime of service to our club.

Selection committee: The current Commodore, Vice-Commodore, and immediate Past Commodore.


The Award itself is a beautiful bronze nautical clock mounted on a very nice plaque. (We actually inherited the clock...and it runs...when WLESC was folded into JRSC several years ago.) It hangs in Pearson Hall next to a print by Winslow Homer, entitled "The Flirt".

"The Flirt" depicts five people sailing on a small boat. One adult and four young crew. The crew are up on the weather rail. To me, that Homer painting really symbolizes the history and heritage of our club...young people enjoying the action of wind on water. The combination of the print and the plaque represent the award. They should always hang together.

Like the Cannon Award, the recipient is to receive a smaller version to take home with them. (Shown in the photo below.)

I am happy to now formally report to the membership that the first recipient of "The Weather Rail", our lifetime achievement award, is Con Crowley.

#### Fire extinguishers-Don't leave the dock without them

Experiencing a fire on your boat is not on your mind as you leave the slip. You are more likely to run aground on a sand bar off Luna Pier, cross over into the live fire range off Camp Perry, or shred the head sail racing around West Sister Island than you are to have a fire on your boat. Still, according to the United States Coast Guard, 316 recreational vessel fires were reported in 2020 and all were with casualties. With few exceptions, recreational boat fires are caused by human error-yes, you can prevent your boat from catching on fire. The best of the recommendations to prevent vessel fires is to maintain your vessel, whether the boat is Catalina 30 or a Catalina 22. Establish the routine that prior to spring launch, closely inspect each system that has the potential to cause a fire, here are a few:

Electrical systems (DC & AC): Are connections tight? Are conductors frayed or insulation cracked, or missing? Are circuits protected from overloads? Are electrical panel clearly marked AC or DC?

Fuel lines: Are fuel line connections tight? Are non-metallic fuel lines drying out or cracking? Are there signs of leaks around hose clamps? Fuel tank: Are there signs of leaks? If using an external tank, is it secure?

Bilge: Has fuel and or oil leaked into the bilge?

Backfire flame arrester: Is the arrester clean? Is it in good repair? Ventilation system (to purge fuel vapors): Does the system work?

## One more preventive measure: "The smoking Lamp is Out"

(translation no smoking on the vessel)

#### Fire Extinguisher Requirements:

Extinguishers older than 12 years must be replaced with newer 5-B or 10-B or 20-B Fixed extinguishing system must have an up to date inspection tag Expired extinguishers may be carried for back up, but not counted toward the requirement

# CON CROWLEY A SAILING LIFE By Phil Fry



There are few people like Con Crowley. If you've ever spent time with him, you know what I mean...no explanation is necessary. Con will be 96 years old this month. He's the club's first recipient of "The Weather Rail" award, recognizing his lifetime of contributions to JRSC.

Con is modest. It's hard to pry his sailing accomplishments out of him. There are many. But he doesn't talk much about himself. So I went to his children to get the "back story" on their father. The following is what I found...

Con Crowley joined Jolly Roger in 1952. His first boat was a 19 foot Lightning that needed work...lots of work. Con was not deterred and the vessel (built of mahogany planks on frames) soon saw water. Con was able to win the Universal Class in that Lightning.

Seeking something bigger, his next boat was a 25 foot yawl. He partnered in this boat with fellow member Jim Machen. After he and Jim sold that boat. Con invested in an Indian Class sailboat that he docked at what is now Lost Peninsula Marina. But he still retained his membership at JRSC.

In 1955 Con married Patricia after dating for a couple of years. Family legend has it that Pat and Con's first date included a sailboat ride.

Through the late 50's and early 60's, Con and Patricia's family kept growing. With the demands of his career and a bigger family, Con stepped away from sailing in 1963. But sailing was in Con's blood, and he always thought of the friends he made and the fun he had at the Jolly Roger Sailing Club.

Around 1974 he rejoined Jolly Roger. He bought an 18 foot Seagull sailboat at that time. The Seagull needed extensive repairs. Con, with his kids by his side, worked on it in the Crowley garage. After countless hours, it was finally ready for water. The family ended up sailing that Seagull for many years.

Con and Patricia had eight children: Carol, Tom, Mike, Mary, P.J., Kay, Tim, and Marty.

Around 1978 Con purchased a Balboa 26 sailboat with a swing keel. He sailed the Balboa for two decades...until the late 1990's. He cruised that Balboa all over the Western Basin, with a few trips up the Detroit River.

Con eventually downsized to a 20 foot keelboat ("Cygnet") that he bought from Elmer Lotshaw. After selling "Cygnet" to a fellow JRSC member, Con then bought an O'Day 23 from Tom Strong. That sailboat, "Con's Tiki" is the most recent entry in his extensive repertoire of boats. You can still find it at JRSC.

If you look around Pearson Hall you'll see the name "Con Crowley" in many places. One year he and I tied in the voting for the Anderson Award. As we stood together accepting the award, I whispered to him, "Con, I voted for you." He replied with that impish chuckle of his, "Phil, I voted for you." And in true Con style he added, "I shouldn't get this...you should." He was wrong, and I was truly honored to share the Anderson Award with him that year.

Although Con has never been a Commodore, he did serve on the Board of Trustees for many years. He has given welcome advice to countless Commodores and officers of our club. He's seen thousands of sailors flow through our ranks. And in those raucous meetings, so common at JRSC, when Con Crowley opens his mouth to speak, the room will grow silent. Listen up everyone. There is wisdom here.

He has left his imprint on us. Con Crowley has made the Jolly Roger Sailing Club a much better place.

So when you see Con at the club this spring...pull up a chair. Ask him about his old wooden Lightning...or about restoring a Seagull in his garage. Ask him about those two decades of water under his Balboa's keel. Ask him about how sailing changed his life...and how it continues to change all of ours.



Bill is looking for ideas on how best to utilize the available space that we have on the Bulkhead. Some ideas were kicked around at the last Board Meeting.


- · Move the Junior shed onto the grassy area, thus freeing up space on the paved portion.


