As I write this it is November 30th and we've all had our fill of Thanksgiving feasts and are now looking forward to Christmas, Hanukah, New Years and the other holidays celebrated this time of year. Hard to believe that we are just 5 short months from launching our boats for the 2024 season. I'm sure looking forward to May, as I know all of you are as well.

In the interim we have a number of exciting events coming up over the winter. Euchre will be starting in January as in previous years, but this year we are also introducing a new cornhole league that will meet for the first time on December 7th, where we will have fun play and figure out how we want the league to proceed. The second meeting will be on December 21st and league play will begin on January 4th and meet the first and 3rd Thursdays of each month. Pasta dinners being served at 6:00 p.m. and game play will begin at 7:00 p.m. There is no fee to play so I hope to see many of you there to join in the fun. Also, let's not forget the great events that our entertainment committee has planned for us which include the Ugly Sweater/White Elephant/Cookie Exchange being held on December 16th. In this part of the country sailing is limited to the warmer seasons but I had the pleasure to travel to San Diego the weekend of Veteran's Day to take part in a companion sail for the Star of India (<a href="https://sdmaritime.org/visit/the-ships/star-of-india/">https://sdmaritime.org/visit/the-ships/star-of-india/</a>). She is a steel hulled sailing vessel that was built in 1863 and is the oldest active sailing vessel in the world. As part of her 160th anniversary The San Diego Maritime Museum organizes a companion sail where we buy passage on one of 3 tall ships/schooners for an all-day sail alongside the Star of India, and what an opportunity this was. I chose to sail on the San Salvador (<a href="https://sdmaritime.org/visit/the-ships/san-salvador/">https://sdmaritime.org/visit/the-ships/san-salvador/</a>), a 1542 replica of the Spanish galleon sailed by Juan Rodriguez Cabrillo, the first ship to reach America's west coast. She was built by skilled craftsman assisted by scores of volunteers from the San Diego Maritime Museum and launched in 2015. I encourage you to read about ships at the URLs provided.

What was it like to sail on a spanish galleon? Magnificent. She had so many lines that I almost felt embarrassed to admit that I sail a Catalina 22 with 2 halyards and 2 jib sheets. She was manned by a crew of 13 and I was 1 of 40 guests, so we had 53 people on this vessel, but somehow the crew handled her riggings like a finely tuned symphony under the command of an able-bodied first mate who was probably half their age. As she set her sails one by one I was awed by the beauty of her architecture and ability to harness the wind. Truly a once in a lifetime experience.

Now for the question of how did she sail, let me just say that I never get sea sick but the ride was an exercise in fighting back the nausea. It was an amazing sail, on a perfect, warm, southern California day and the seas were fair with minor swells and 2-3 ft waves, so not what I would have anticipated would cause sea sickness, but what I didn't count on was how high the ship sat on the water and the relatively short length, which meant a ride full of slow rolling sways back and forth and up and down at the same time. I certainly have great sympathy for all the early sailors who were on these relatively small ships, for many months at a time on seas a whole lot more challenging than the calm of this day. What an amazing experience and I absolutely would do it again, but next time I'd take Dramamine.

He has circumnavigated around New Zealand, crossed the Caribbean Sea twice, Crossed the Pacific Ocean solo handed. In 2016 he made the Atlantic Crossing, also solo handed.

I know I will never try any of his accomplishments in what years I have left on this earth. His story however is a very interesting one, He took diversity and made it his own. Sailing is only one of the many challenges we face in the course of our lives. If you are like me, I sometimes meet a challenge head on. Other times I need to think about it and may give up on that idea altogether.

Jonathan, however, got into sailing during a short course like many of our new club members who have taken the Jolly Roger sailing course. He then bought a run-down boat and took three years to renovate it for launching in 2010. Looking at the above accomplishments Jonathan made, they were done in just 6 years. That in itself is an unbelievable accomplishment for some to even understand or think about.

We as sailors have different learning curves, but all of us have similar goals. The biggest goal of course is to harness the wind, and make it safely back to port. Jonathan had another interesting sport which was a skydiving instructor. During a new years eve jump in 2012 he had an accident that left him a paraplegic. I am not sure how I would handle such a traumatic situation as that. Johnthan, when asked about the accident says it was a gift. He knew that if he lived through the accident he would go back to sailing.

Johnthan is still sailing today and carving out new adventures for himself. He is supposed to have written a book and I believe this to be the title if you are interested." How to survive a shipwreck: Help is on the way and love is already here."


A final thought no matter how big a struggle may enter your life, if you are persistent enough, have the mindset, and keep on trying your accomplishments will astound you.






