
Commodore's Column January 2024



Hello Jolly Roger Family

I will see you on Feb 13th for our general meeting, and hope that you are attending our cornhole and euchre tournaments. Also don't forget the Fun Lunch Bunch on the 14th. I want to extend a very Happy Birthday to anyone born on the 29th of the month, as it is not everyone that can be four years older on their birthday.

I have begun posting the roster for work hours, and will do so before the general meeting every month. Do feel free to email me with questions about your work hours or any other club business you may have.

This month's column is about the history of the **DRUNKEN SAILOR**. We have all heard that term somewhere in our lives. It goes hand in hand with "three sheets to the wind" The history of the drunken sailor even through a stereotype does have some truth behind it. Don't believe it just ask someone who was in the U.S. Navy.

So why the stigma? In old sailing days water was not readily available. Booze was. Unfortunately, wine and beer spoiled on board during long voyages. Rum could be stored for long periods of time. Rum always seemed fresh due to its high content of alcohol. Rum also mixes well with water. You may have been somewhere that offered a beverage called a *GROG*. This beverage was invented by those early seamen, although not like the modern-day version. Sailors mixed rum with what little water they had in order to increase the amount of liquid volume.

Sailors were also responsible for the concept of citrus being mixed with alcohol. Limes were a popular fruit onboard Caribbean sailing vessels since they provided sailors much-needed vitamin C to prevent scurvy. Along with their daily ration of grog, they'd mix the sour juice in, add a bit of sugar, and bam: you've got yourself a mojito.

As Paul Harvey would say "now the rest of the story". Life was hell on those ships, and that was when they weren't fighting. When the cannons were firing and the cannonballs, grapeshot, chain, broken spars and splinters were flying, it was worse than hell. The daily ration of rum or its somewhat watered-down variant grog probably didn't make that enjoyable, but it helps explain the low incidence of mutiny on those old ships

It might also have supplied some of the courage needed to board an enemy ship or crawl to the end of a yardarm in a sleeting, Cape Horn gale. It even eased everyday chores. Splicing the main brace, a 5-inch-thick line on some ships, was such an onerous job that the crew often got an extra ration of rum after completing it, Grog does have another alternate definition that will be explained in a moment.

In the 1700's Admiral Edward Vernon of the Royal Navy wore a cloak called a grogram. He became known as "old grog". He was a tyrant of a man and known to be caustic towards his men, and therefore ordered the men's rum to be diluted. The name stuck and later the definition meant strong drink of any kind. Should you like more of the story about the old grog here is a link that I am sure will intrigue your curiosity.

Yet to harness the wind like they did, is still the same as it was in 1700 or now in 2024. The knowledge of the wind, water, your boat, and skill of the captain are still the keys to navigation.

Weather your beverage is a soft drink or the hearty GROG. I raise my glass to you the membership in this coming new year.

Little did I know at that time, he would never be sitting in that chair with all of us again.

THE SPRING OF 1980, THE CATTAIL REGATTA,

The day I met Vince Hebert

Vince Hebert was a large man, which was worrisome as he was going to be crew on my father's Thistle. I worried about the extra weight on what seemed to be a light wind day. The extra weight, as it turned out, was actually a godsend rather than a hindrance.

We met at the club on Saturday morning, getting the boat ready to launch, making sure we had everything we would need, and Vince was help-ful and jovial. A successful launch of the Thistle and we made our way down the Ottawa river to the racing area in the Bay. As we sailed toward the race-course Dad made sure everyone knew what their job was, and we made a few jokes about not worrying about keeping the boat flat, we had good movable ballast.

As we turned East at the mouth of the river, we were able to set the spinnaker and get in some gybing practice and dowsing practice as well. We made our way into the bay and started reaching back and forth waiting for the line to be set, then like it came out of nowhere, a black cloud that carried a lot of wind and rain, the dreaded squall. Before we knew it we were on plane and skimming the tops of the waves, Dad was yelling (so we could hear him over the din) to "Take the mainsail down, release the halyard", so Vince reached over and pulled really hard on the halyard (on a Thistle there is a bead on the wire halyard that has to be released before letting the halyard down) he pulled a bit too hard, the halyard broke and down came the mainsail. We both responded, "The mainsails down!" followed by a chuckle.

As Vince and I gathered up the mainsail and got it strapped to the boom, we were still skimming the tops of the waves. Dad was keeping us away from other boats, it was chaos all around. We encountered a Hobie cat with its mast down and the skipper asked for a tow, now mind you, we were still just sailing on the jib, going quite fast and so Dad said sure, toss us a line and we can give you a tow.

The fellow tossed us a line as we passed him on a reach, I made the line fast to a stern cleat and turned and watched the slack get pulled out of the line. As the line drew taut the water sprayed off and then we realized the other skipper had not made the line fast at his end, he was just holding onto it.

We truly enjoyed the beautiful arching curve he made as he was yanked right off the Hobie Cat, into the air, making a smooth entry into the water and started body surfing behind us and leaving his female crew alone on the boat.

We convinced him to let go and swim back to his boat, we dropped the line back at his boat and sailed to the race committee to tell them he needed assistance.

This story has been told many times over the years and hearing Vince tell it was always a joy, he could spin a tale in such a way that you felt you were there with him (though I actually was). My wife told me the story over the phone after she returned from the Christmas Party, so I knew Vince had entertained her and I was grateful.

We are going to miss you Vince Hebert, may you rest in peace and the wind in your sails be forever favorable.

DUCK PUNT-ITIS AWARENESS

Duck Punt-itis is a serious affliction continuing to infect boaters across the world. Duck Punts have existed for over 200 years. The current "sailing" strain of the West Mersea Duck Punk escaped a British facility in 2001. It is highly infectious. I'm sad to report that two of our JRSC members are already stricken.

The West Mersea Duck Punt is essentially a sailing canoe. It can be rowed, sailed, and raced. It is a 16' hard chined wooden boat that can navigate in 3 to 6 inches of water (depending upon load). Costing around \$1K to build (often less), it can infect anyone. No one is immune.

The Duck Punt is easy to build and uses the widely available Opti (sprit) rig for sailing. You steer with a paddle and can row it with oars. It can be car topped or pulled with a trailer, even behind a small car. With such versatility you can see why the West Mersea strain can appear anywhere bodies of water are present. There are no recorded cases in either Death Valley or the Sahara.

Duck Punters claim it is "great fun" to sail. Obviously, a delirium caused by the disease. Punters don't use any gasoline (no motor) and row when the wind is uncooperative. These poor souls. Watch this YouTube video to see several infected individuals bravely fighting this disease.



... is for people who have some Race Committee (RC) experience, but newcomers are also welcome. Topics include RC objectives and responsibilities, regatta safety, writing sailing instructions, RC jobs, equipment, setting the course, starting system, starting penalties, before the start, during the race, finishing and scoring.

What to Bring: You will need your own copy of The Racing Rules of Sailing.

Study Materials: You should answer the Basic Race Management Seminar Study Questions, which will help you find your way around the rule book.

The Club Race Officer certification test, available online at the conclusion of the seminar, is optional. In order to be certified as a US Sailing Club Race Officer, however, you must attend a complete seminar and pass the test, as well as own a copy of *The Race Management Handbook* and meet the program's other criteria. Details of the other requirements for certification are available at the Race Officer section of the US Sailing web site.

The 2024 JRSC Cattail Regatta will be raced on a windward / leeward course on the Maumee Bay (alternative racing on the Ottawa River should weather conditions warrant).

Registration Fee: \$30 per boat

We will have bottled water and snack bags available free of charge for all participating crews. JRSC will be hosting a cook out after the race for \$15 per person. Overnight camping for traveling crews is available at no additional charge.

The Catalina 22 Class will also be competing for the Bruce Sondys Memorial Trophy. The Interlake Class will also be competing for the Founder's Cup.

Although one race will constitute a series, we will attempt to run three or more races (weather conditions permitting). The exact format and starting order will be included in the Sailing Instructions (available at registration).

This regatta will be governed and scored per the 2021-2024 Racing Rules of Sailing, the prescription of the One-Design rules, and the specific Sailing Instructions of this regatta.

The Cattail Regatta is open to all One-Design classes with a minimum of three boats per class.

1200: Start of First Class, Race 1. Races 2-3-4 to Follow. (No starts after 1600.)

The Cattail Regatta will be sailed on a windward / leeward course with the start and finish lines at the center of the course. The length and number of times around the course will depend on wind conditions and the performance capabilities of the Class.

Registration will occur by mail and also on the day of the event. We ask that you email us in advance if you plan to attend, so that we may have ample food on hand for all participants.

Section 3 - Work Obligation

All Active, Social, and Junior members shall be required to accomplish certain authorized hours of work on Club projects each year. The number of hours required shall be established annually by the Board of Trustees consistent with the needs of the Club, provided, however, the total so established shall not exceed sixteen (16) hours annually to be determined by the Board of Directors,, and except as provided in this Section, shall apply to all Active, Social, and Junior members are a set number of hours not to exceed sixteen work hours be accomplished or paid for each year prior to the member being entitled to use the Club's sailboat facilities.

Work obligations shall be pro-rated for any portion of the remaining year for new or converted memberships. Any family member 13 years old or older may accomplish work hours to be credited to the Family's obligation subject to the approval of the appropriate committee chairperson.

The work obligation shall not apply to the members of the Board of Trustees, Officers, or Committee Chairpersons during the period they hold office. Also, any Active member who notifies the Board of Trustees in writing, before January 31 or within 30 days of election or transfer to Active Membership of his intent not to actively sail his/her boat will not be required to perform the required work hours or make alternate payment. If such member subsequently sails in a Club sanctioned race, sails in a regatta as a member of this club or uses the Club's sailboat facilities, that member will be liable for work hours or alternate payment for the entire year or the fraction thereof of Active Membership. Members at age 67 or over are not required work hours.

The work obligation shall be performed within a 12-month time period prior to December 1 of the current year. It shall be each member's responsibility to report in writing to the Vice-Commodore or his designate, all work hours performed within sixty (60) days of such performance to receive credit. All work hour slips are to be signed by the work party chairperson.

Section 4 - Amount

The fiscal year of the Club shall be the calendar year. At the regular meeting of the Board of Trustees held in November each year, the Commodore, with the assistance of the Treasurer, shall present the proposed budget for the upcoming year and shall propose a schedule of dues, initiation fees, and work obligation fees which shall not be less than the aggregate of expected expenses. The Board of Trustees, by two-thirds (2/3) majority vote shall establish the budget and schedule of dues and fees and submit them for ratification at the regular meeting of members in December. Ratification shall require a majority vote of the members voting. Upon failure of ratification, the dues shall remain at the current level and the budget shall be modified accordingly.

Each class of member must accomplish the following number of work hours per year as provided for in these rules or pay the applicable fee: Active –16 hours Social ---6 hours Junior---3 hours With the following exception: Any member exceeding 67 years of age, regardless of membership class, will no longer be required to perform work hours.




